A teaching on "due process"

The American Way of Life is to practice our common law. It is that simple.

If you have an issue with someone, contact the individual privately and address the issue. If not resolved, both parties agree on a mediator to resolve the issues(s).

If the issue is still not resolved, assemble a grand jury of the people (our peers). Both parties present their cases to the grand jury. The grand jury's decision is final.

We wish for all to practice *rights*, that is the "common law due process," and NOT practice wrongs, which entertain defamation of character, are unconstitutional, therefore, null and void. *See* Marbury v. Madison 1803 A.D.

Let us practice *rights* NOT wrongs.

Amendment I, *Bill of Rights*, United States Constitution

Passed by Congress September 25, 1789 A.D. Ratified December 15, 1791 A.D.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the **right of the people peaceably to assemble**, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Now let's look at the meaning of words in Amendment I

People: The body of persons [men or women: NOT the corporate PERSON the artificial men or women] who compose a community, town or nation. We say, the *people* of a town; the *people* of London or Paris; the English *people*. In this sense, the word is not used in the plural, but it comprehends all classes of inhabitants, considered as a collective body, or any portion of the inhabitants of a city or country.

Assemble: To collect a number of individuals or particulars into one place, or body; to bring or call together; to convene; to congregate. To meet or come together; to convene; as a number of individuals.

Assembly: a company or collection of individuals, in the same place, usually for the same purpose. *See* American Dictionary of the English Language, Noah Webster 1828 A.D.

And the Private Legal Society agrees

ASSEMBLY: *Popular* assemblies are those where the people meet to deliberate upon their rights; these are guaranteed by the constitution. Const. U.S. Amend. Art. 1.

Amendment V, Bill of Rights, United States Constitution

Passed by Congress September 25, 1789 A.D. Ratified December 15, 1791 A.D.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a **Grand Jury**, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb, nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

If you believe you have an issue(s) that needs to be resolved, please follow the common law due process as written in our *Bill of Rights*.
